

Family Discipleship Kit for Fall 2022

This 10 week study focuses on five themes in Proverbs 3:1-12 that serve as a summary for the book of Proverbs in general.

The family discipleship kit includes family-oriented discussion questions, daily Bible reading plan (with both short and long options), and a weekly prayer focus with progress-tracking stickers.

This study will coordinate with the Young Disciples' verse memory project of Proverbs 3:1-12, and Pastor John's new sermon series, "Listening to the Ancients."

Proverbs: A Mini-Guide to Life

In my regular, daily Bible reading over the past year I read through Proverbs 3, a passage I've studied and preached through many times. But during this reading, I realized that in verses 3 through 12 we have all the themes of the rest of the book, and therefore a kind of mini-guide to faithful living. There are five things that comprise a wise, godly life. They function both as means to becoming wise and godly as well as signs that you are growing into such a life:

1. Put your heart's deepest trust in God and his grace. Every day remind yourself of his unconditioned, covenantal love for you. Do not instead put your hopes in idols or in your own performance.

Let love and faithfulness never leave you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart. Then you will win favor and a good name in the sight of God and man. Trust in the LORD with all your heart (Prov 3:3-5a)

2. Submit your whole mind to the Scripture. Don't think you know better than God's word. Bring it to bear on every area of life. Become a person under authority.

Lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight. (Prov 3:5b-6)

3. Be humble and teachable toward others. Be forgiving and understanding when you want to be critical of them; be ready to learn from others when they come to be critical of you.

Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD and shun evil. This will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones. (Prov 3:7-8)

4. Be generous with all your possessions, and passionate about justice. Share your time, talent, and treasure with those who have less.

Honor the LORD with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing, and your vats will brim over with new wine. (Prov 3:9-10)

5. Accept and learn from difficulties and suffering. Through the gospel, recognize them as not punishment, but a way of refining you.

My son, do not despise the LORD's discipline and do not resent his rebuke, because the LORD disciplines those he loves, as a father the son he delights in. (Prov 3:11-12)

As I meditated on these five elements—rooted in his grace, obeying and delighting in his Word, humble before other people, sacrificially generous toward our neighbor, and steadfast in trials—I thought of Jesus. The New Testament tells us that the personified 'divine wisdom' of the Old Testament is actually Jesus (Mt 11:19.) And I realized that a) he showed the ultimate trust and faithfulness to God and to us by going to the cross, b) he was saturated with and shaped by Scripture, c) he was meek and lowly in heart (Mt. 11:28-30), d) he, though rich, became poor for us, e) and he bore his suffering, for us, without complaint. We can only grow in these five areas if you know you are saved by costly grace. That keeps you from idols, from self-sufficiency and pride, from selfishness with your things, and from crumbling under troubles. Jesus is wisdom personified, and believing his gospel brings these character qualities into your life.

For a number of weeks I have been spending time praying for these five things for my family and my church leaders. There's no better way to instill these great things in your own heart, than to pray intensely for them in the lives of those you love.

We Forget, but Jesus Remembers

1 REMEMBER THE GOSPEL

Remembering the gospel means regularly review, meditate on, and open yourself up to the vulnerabilites of: God's holy law (and our inability to keep it), the depths of our sin, the extent of God's grace, the agony of Jesus's sacrifice, and the great relief of forgiveness.

To not forget his teachings we must always have gospel truth in front of us, calibrating our wants and desires, and setting our minds on things above.

This, of course, is impossible without Jesus: we are powerless to *even remember* the gospel, were it not for the gospel first enabling us to do so.

While we were outcasts, God remembered us. While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. When we are faithless, He is faithful to his covenant. While we hold grudges, he forgets our transgressions and remembers them no more. While we forget Him, he remembers us.



Favor and a Good Name

1 REMEMBER THE GOSPEL

As important as it is to remember that "we lost it all" and "Jesus did it all" we cannot forget the promise, "we get it all"! The good news, after all, is...well, good!

The book of Proverbs is full of descriptions of the good consequences that *generally* occur when we do what is right. They aren't so much promises as they are common benefits of wisdom.

But through the lens of the gospel, we often get an even deeper and truer understanding of these "rewards" for wisdom. Take Proverbs 3:1-2 as an example. Those who obey their parents may tend to have less problems here on earth. But through the gospel, we have been given a Father in Heaven. Through the gospel, we are able to hide his commands in our heart, growing in trust and obedience through the washing of the Word.

Through the gospel, we get to experience peace and prosperty for an eternity!



We Rebel, but Jesus Submitted

2 SUBMIT TO GOD

Trusting in the Lord with all your heart means giving him the reigns and doubting your own interpretation of reality: to trust God more than your experience, desires, and even what your five senses tell you!

In this way, Eve's first sin in the Garden was not sinking her teeth into the flesh of the fruit, but shifting her trust from God's words to her own analysis of the facts.

In contrast, Jesus denies the bread that Satan offers, not because he isn't hungry or able -- but because "Man does not live on bread alone, but on every Word that comes from the Father."

We are constantly in rebellion against God and the truth of his Word, but Jesus was always obedient, even unto death! Our submission requires a sort of death, too. We must be crucified with Christ in order to truly live. Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

2 SUBMIT TO GOD

Big decisions are difficult because we we don't know everything. We can't know the future, because it hasn't happened yet. We can't know all the variables and forces influencing us in the present, because our minds and perceptions are finite. We can't even perfectly know the past, because can only rely on our faulty memory and other imperfect representations.

That is why it is such a sweet encouragement to remember that God, who exists in the past, present, and future -- knows all and understands all. More than that, he is sovereign over it all, too -- so that all things are working together for his glory and purpose.

What a blessing to have our paths made straight for us; to have lamp unto our feet and a light onto our path. Our good shepherd comforts us with a rod and staff, poking and proding us toward the good future he has prepared for us in advance.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

We are Proud, but Jesus Humbled Himself

3 HUMBLE YOURSELF

Humbling yourself means thinking less about yourself and more about others. It requires an accurate picture of yourself -- not that you are worse than anyone else, but that you are no better. And more importantly, you are far inferior to the perfect and holy God.

This attitude is completely at odds with our sinful nature! From the moment of our birth, we attempt to assert our dominance, establish our own kingdom, and fight for our own wants over the needs of others. In our pride, we are fools. We fight for things that will make us misreable, and reject the things that bring life.

How surprising and gracious that *Jesus* -- who *actually is* the King over all, humbles himself in order to free us from our slavery to pride.

Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord and shun evil. This will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones.

3 HUMBLE YOURSELF

Humility brings health to your body and nourishment to your bones because only the humble are able to recognize their lives are but a vapor. Health and youth are fleeting, and once gone -- never recoverable.

A humble person recognizes that they have needs for rest and nourishment, while a fool assumes they are invincible.

But through the lens of the gospel, we are given a greater, more exciting understanding of this "reward": those who have humbled themselves in the sight of the Lord have the resurrection to look forward to. Not only health to their mortal bodies, but a brand new body, unmarred by the curse of sin.

Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord and shun evil. **This** will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones.

4 GIVE GENEROUSLY

If "Remembering the Gospel" and "Submitting to God" had to do with our vertical relationship with God, and "Humbling Ourselves" dealt with our horizontal relationships interpersonally, "Giving Generously" deals with our relationship to our posessions.

We ought not forget that everything we have belongs first to God. Even ourselves -- our talents, our time, our identity -- does not belong to us, but to God. So how much more should we give to God the first fruits of our wealth? How much more easily should we part with our posessions?

Jesus himself gave up riches to become poor. On earth he had no home or posessions. He became poor so that we could become rich.

Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing, and your vats will brim over with new wine.

4 GIVE GENEROUSLY

Were it not enough that Jesus generously gives us his life for our sake, he heaps on even more blessing. Since Jesus took the punishment for our sin, we are now adopted as sons and daughters of God; co-heirs with Christ to a glorious inheritance!

Like an overflowing barn and vats filled with new wine guaranteed security far into the future, our inheritance is also secure. Our treasures in Heaven can not fade away and leave us disappointed. We get it all!

This is why we can be generous with our wealth -- our Father already owns it all, what should we fear? "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you."

5 PERSEVERE IN SUFFERING

When faced with suffering, we can be tempted to ask why God is punishing us. We justify ourselves and angrily complain that our circumstances aren't fair.

The irony is rich, however. The truth is we have not been given what we deserve, for what we deserve is hell. Jesus, who deserved only blessing and honor, willingly takes our punishment and dies in our place.

Our debt is cancelled, for Jesus pays it all. So when we are given the opportunity to suffer, we can interpret the hardships as discipline from a loving Father: a Father who tenderly prunes away the parts of us that do not bear fruit.

That why we can consider it pure joy when we face trials of many kinds. Our pain has a purpose!
